The Brain Is Like a Battery – And You Might Be Running on Low Power

Welcome to April. A month of longer light, daffodils in bloom, and magnolias just beginning to stir. Everything's coming back to life outside—but how's your inner world doing?

This issue, we're turning the spotlight to the brain.

Some days, everything just feels harder than it should. Simple things take longer. Conversations feel like effort. You walk into a room and forget why. You start five things and finish none.

It's easy to dismiss it as just tiredness—or getting older. But often, it's something else entirely: your brain is overloaded.

The part of the brain that handles decisions, focus, and self-control—the **prefrontal cortex**—is powerful, but it doesn't have endless reserves. Every small demand throughout the day—What should I cook? Did I reply to that message? Where did I leave my keys?—slowly drains its energy. When that part runs low, everything feels heavier.

You might notice it in your mood—more reactive, less patient. Or in your focus more distracted, less sharp. It's the kind of fog that doesn't lift just because you slept well.

But here's the thing: brains, like batteries, can recharge.

And April, with its sense of renewal, is the perfect time to start plugging back in.

You don't need big changes. Sometimes it's about doing less, not more. Simplify routines. Reduce decisions where you can. Leave one thing unfinished. Give your brain just enough space to breathe.

If your brain had a battery icon, what would it be showing right now? If it's flashing red—or even just hovering on low—maybe it's time to pause, even briefly, and recharge before it runs flat.

Mental health isn't just about managing stress—it's about creating space for clarity to return.

This month, as the world begins to wake up, give your mind a little space to do the same. Next month, we'll explore how your brain responds to pressure—and why it sometimes feels like your thoughts are stuck in survival mode.

I've recently found myself living alone after the breakdown of my relationship. My council tax bill is due soon, and I'm worried I won't be able to afford to pay it on my own. I'm already struggling to cover the cost of my other bills. What can I do?

Here are some steps you can take to ease your financial worries:

Single Person Discount: Since you're now living alone, you can receive a 25% discount on your council tax. Make sure to notify your local council that you're the only adult in the household. Even if the person who left has been gone for some time, you're entitled to the discount from their departure date.

Disregarded People: If there are people living with you who are disregarded for council tax purposes (such as full-time students, under-18s, long-term hospital patients, etc.), it can reduce the number of people considered for council tax purposes, possibly leading to a discount. You can check online for a list of who counts as disregarded.

Second Adult Rebate: If there's another adult living with you who is on a low income or receiving certain benefits, you could be eligible for a 'second adult rebate,' which reduces your council tax.

Disability Reduction: If you or anyone you live with is disabled and your home has been adapted for that disability, you might be eligible to have your council tax band reduced. For example, a band C property that's been adapted for a disabled resident could be re-banded to a band B property, which would lower your bill.

Council Tax Reduction (CTR): If you have a low income, you can apply for a Council Tax Reduction, which may lower your bill. The council will ask about your income and circumstances to determine if you qualify. If you've reached State Pension age, different rules may apply. Discretionary Reduction: In cases of severe financial hardship, your council can offer a discretionary reduction, which can reduce or even cancel your council tax. You will need to provide evidence of your situation. If you're denied this reduction, you can appeal to a valuation tribunal, which could order the council to reduce or cancel your bill.

Seek Help: It's essential to communicate with your local council. If you're struggling, let them know as soon as possible. You can also reach out to Citizens Advice for assistance in navigating your options.


Community Speed Watch

CONCERNS FOR MOTORISTS SPEEDING THROUGH FELSHAM & GEDDING

Do you sometimes feel motorists are driving a little too fast through the village? Maybe you or your neighbour is of reduced mobility, or you have young children?

Exceeding a speed limit by 5 miles may not seem much, but when a maximum speed limit is 30 and the driver is driving at 35 or 40 mph, the stopping distance could be the difference between stopping in time or hitting someone.

A reminder of the thinking plus braking distance: -



Community Speed Watch is a scheme to help people reduce traffic speeding through their neighbourhood. Excessive speed has an impact not only on road safety but on the quality of life for those residents who endure it.

The scheme enables volunteers to work within their community to raise awareness of the dangers of speeding and to help control the problem locally. It requires a minimum of 6 volunteers, all over 18 years old. Training will be provided and volunteers will be covered by the Constabulary's insurance.

Our Parish Council would like to set a community group but they need the support of any as many volunteers as possible.



Gedding Church News

Gedding Church is going through tough times at the moment. Over the past couple of years attendance at services has been decreasing, which means we are also getting very little income from the collection! The bank account is running very low, and although the recent letter that was sent out to ask for money for the church brought a little in, it is not enough to sustain the life of this church as it currently stands. The congregation for the monthly Sunday service is now down to 3-4 people.

After discussion, the PCC of Felsham and Gedding (as it is a joint parish), agreed to write to the Diocesan Bishop to ask for his permission to make Gedding a 'Festival Church'. This means that within the Bishop's authority we can reduce the number of services that we hold there throughout the year to 'festival times' such as Easter and Christmas or the patronal festival in the summer.

The monthly service will come to an end this June, and we would like to hold a picnic in the Churchyard to mark the start of the 'Festival Church' time for Gedding to which everyone in Gedding (and anyone from Felsham!) is invited. This will also be an opportunity to ask questions about the future of Gedding Church, as without funds to pay for insurance and maintenance it is difficult to make predictions for its future.

We shall be choosing a date in July/August to hold the picnic, and hope to do this one Sunday afternoon. We hope that many of the community will come and join us, and more details will be forthcoming. In the meantime, if you have any questions do please be in contact with me.

Devolution and Local Government Reorganization Update

The government has now confirmed that Suffolk and Norfolk are included in the Devolution Priority Programme, and have agreed to the request from the Suffolk County Council administration to cancel this year's local elections in May. This means that councils in Suffolk now need to work on proposals for reorganisation to submit to the government by the autumn,

Suffolk County Council has announced that it will be proposing one single unitary council for Suffolk, although district and borough councils have been clear that they would prefer two or three. All the councils need to submit their proposals to the government by 21 March 2025.

The plan is for a mayor for Norfolk and Suffolk to be elected in May 2026, along with councillors for new authorities, so the timeline for these changes is very tight. The government has launched a public consultation on proposals to create a Mayoral Combined County Authority for Norfolk and Suffolk, and you can give your views on the proposals by using this link: https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/norfolk-and-suffolkdevolution

Suffolk Fire and Rescue Inspection Report

On Monday 10 February, The Home Office published a report of its recent inspection of Suffolk's Fire and Rescue Service. Although the inspection found that the service was good at preventing fires, protecting the public and that it met requirements for responding to major incidents, the report was also concerning as it several areas where the service needed to improve, including improving culture and morale, senior leaders to act as role models and show they are committed to the values of the service through their behaviour, improving communication between staff and senior leaders and making sure employees are confident raising concerns. You may have read in the press recently that the Fire Brigades Union is alleging that Suffolk County Council has made mistakes processing firefighter pay and pensions for years and has not addressed them or listened to employee concerns about the errors.

Suffolk County Council has subsequently announced additional investment of an extra £1.6 million over two years to improve the service, and this proposal will be decided at Cabinet in March. Active Travel Fund Award

Suffolk County Council has been awarded £3.7 million from the government to encourage cycling, walking and active travel across the county, and to make journeys more accessible. This comprises £0.9 million from the Round 5 of the Active Travel Fund, and £2.8 million from the Consolidated Active Travel Fund. The money can be spent on the following schemes: footpaths and crossing points, maintaining existing walking and cycling infrastructure, improving cycle routes and Public Rights of Way, traffic calming, and rail station access improvements. The council is currently considering suitable local projects, which will be announced in the coming months.

Changes to Suffolk's Library Service are Moving Back In-House

Suffolk County Council has announced that from 1 June 2025, its libraries service will be moved back in-house. Currently the libraries are run by a local charity, Suffolk Libraries, but negotiations on the new contract have now broken down. The council made the decision to divest its libraries in

2012 and they have been run by Suffolk Libraries ever since then. The council is reassuring residents and library employees and volunteers that no front-line jobs will be cut, that libraries will remain open and there will be no reduction to opening hours. Running the library service had been financially challenging in recent years, with the council agreeing to provide an extra £720k in May 2023 for that financial year. The council is also keen to reassure Friends groups that money raised for local libraries will still be used for those libraries.

Local Transport Plan and Area Transport Plans

At Cabinet on Tuesday 25 February, a Local Transport Plan for the county from 2025-2040. The plan is needed by law to access funding from the government for active travel and major transport schemes, and details how the council plans to prioritise walking, cycling and wheeling in town centres to reduce congestion and air pollution. It also describes the projects that will be needed to improve transport links for Suffolk, such as works at Ely and Haughley railway junctions, better public transport, and how to manage the transition from fossil fuels. Also agreed were 15 Area Transport Plans detailing the council's transport ambitions for towns around Suffolk.



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
